GreenStage has been performing in the Seattle area since 1989. In that time we have produced twenty-six productions, eighteen from Shakespeare's canon. Our season includes two outdoor touring productions each summer, which have become a tradition for many and are seen by thousands of area residents and visitors. In the fall we present an indoor production in the spring we make an annual appearance in the Seattle Fringe Theater Festival.

ABOUT THE PLAY

One of Shakespeare's final plays, The Winter's Tale is a fantastical and poignant story of jealousy, redemption, and the healing power of time.

King Leontes of Sicilia, consumed by mad jealousy, suspects a tryst between his wife, Hermione, and his friend, Polixenes - King of Bohemia. Assuming his newborn daughter to be the result of their affair, Leontes condemns his wife to prison and demands that the baby, Perdita, be discarded and left to die. Abandoned on the wild shores of Bohemia, the infant is found by a kind shepherd who vows to raise her as his own.

Time then takes us forward sixteen years to find young Perdita in love with Polixenes' son, Prince Florizel. When King Polixenes discovers his son's intention to marry a common shepherd girl, his rage forces the young couple to flee the country, landing them on the shores of Sicilia.

Just when it seems that all hope for happiness is gone, Shakespeare works his magic, mixing truth, grace, and redemption to create an ending that is as beautiful as it is profound.


