



Director's Note

As children we all have a dark side; a sense of morbid curiosity that makes us wonder what's going to happen next.

Where I grew up as a child in the seventies, dead animals were often left on the side of the road for weeks, and I would pass them on my way to and from school and notice the changes. Depending on the time of the year, the rains would come into play. Eventually, I knew what was going to happen next.

K-12 was a time of wonder and discovery. Horror movies were great – The Wolfman, The Creature From the Black Lagoon, House of Frankenstein. Eventually blood made its way onto the silver screen in such indie classics as Texas Chainsaw Massacre and The Evil Dead. This not so new form of entertainment appeals to the creepy little kid in all of us.

It's unfortunate some people feel the need to grow up. It's important to eventually attain some level of adulthood, but that doesn't mean we have to grow up. The Hard Bard approach reminds us that quality writing coupled with copious amounts of blood allows us to retain our childhood curiosity as we gleefully wonder, "what's going to happen next?"

We're all just a bunch of creepy little kids. It's funny, 'cause it's true. Please enjoy the show.

A Short Synopsis of the Show

As the play begins, the Cardinal and Ferdinand, Duke of Calabria, prepare to leave their widowed sister's court. Ferdinand hires a known villain, Bosola, to keep an eye on his twin sister because of. . .reasons. Despite swearing to her brothers she will never marry, the Duchess of Malfi soon secretly weds her lowly steward, Antonio Bologna. When she bears Antonio an adorable little son, Bosola discovers the pregnancy and sends the news to the irate brothers.

Ferdinand confronts his sister, swearing he will never see her again. In an attempt to escape, she pretends Antonio swindled her and sends him out of court. Thinking Bosola a trusty servant, the Duchess tells him of her marriage and her plans to flee with her family to Ancona. Bosola gives the news directly to her brothers.

In Ancona, the Cardinal takes up arms and has the Duchess banished. Antonio and his son escape to Milan, but the Duchess is taken back to her court as a prisoner where Ferdinand does all he can to drive his sister insane or worse.

After the Duchess' death, Bosola goes to Milan to get his payment. Ferdinand has been a little off ever since the murder, so Bosola proceeds carefully. He uses the Cardinal's mistress, Julia, to find out the Cardinal's involvement in the Duchess' death. Upon learning the Cardinal's plans to dispose of Antonio and anyone else that gets in his way, Bosola decides to get his own revenge.

None of the revenge plots turn out as planned. But there will be blood. Lots and lots of blood.
