

Friends of GreenStage.... TWELCOME TO GREENSTAGE'S SHAKESPEARE IN THE PARK!



You are here, our cast is complete. Welcome.

Thank you for being part of our 23rd season of free theatre. Since 1989 GreenStage has been bringing free theatre to Puget Sound audiences. As Washington's longest running Shakespeare company, we have grown from performing one show for a small audience in two or three locations to reaching 11,000 people in a dozen parks throughout Puget Sound. Our season now includes two parks shows and we move indoors for our very popular Hard Bard Production at Halloween. All Free – all the time.

While preparing to write this note I had a particularly bad day and thought to myself, "who cares, does it even matter?" The answer came swiftly and was a resounding "It is imperative!" There is more and more that pulls us from ourselves and each other, disregards or devalues our essential humanity, and the loss of that is, to me, the loss of all. Live theatre is an intimate communion shared by all present, it is a feast of the beauty, foibles, triumphs and challenges that face us as individuals and as a society; it reminds us of our humanity. We do it free, because it is the soul's food and those who are hungry should be fed.

In addition, the arts inspire imagination, analytical thought, and greater understanding of the world. Children involved in the arts generally have higher test scores, are more likely to graduate and are less likely to run amok. Recent budget cuts have left many school systems in Washington state with little or no arts programming. Many children will go through school without exposure to great music, art, dance, theatre – never experiencing a live performance. I find this trend stunning and alarming. We are developing school programs to help fill that gap. Our education program, now offers summer camps and ongoing classes for children and adults, professionals and not; and always looking for new ways to reach out and build community.

Over the past 23 years many people have participated in GreenStage; on stage, behind the scenes and in the audience – how they have been touched and what they have been inspired to do as a result is too limitless to know. Some are studying arts in college, some have gone to other cities and started new theatre companies, some have gone to see other plays or to a museum, some have read another Shakespeare play, even though after finishing high school they swore they never would. Take a moment and look around you; this beautiful park and this beautiful community of souls all joined together to create this moment tonight – this one moment that you will share and will never be again, but whose ripples are infinite. Thank you. Enjoy the show.

ANTONY AND CLEOPATRA



Every day brings news of wars abroad. Factions divide and subdivide, struggling for power and political ideals. Everyone wants victory, but mostly they pray for peace. Egypt is in a state of tumult, and its long-ruling dynasty, for better or for worse, is about to falter. It could be ancient Rome, or it could be next Tuesday. The more things change, the more they stay the same.

At the opening of Antony and Cleopatra, Rome stands on a shaky foundation. Julius Caesar is dead,

and the civil war that followed his assassination has ended. Three generals wield power in a tenuous alliance: the young and ambitious Octavius, the old and obsequious Lepidus, and Mark Antony, who has laid political duty aside in favor of more amorous pursuits. As foreign and domestic enemies continue to threaten the state, this alliance is doomed to collapse.

In Cleopatra's Egypt, by contrast, the only civic duty is to suck the marrow out of life. Here, love is law, magic is mundane, and the martial austerity of Rome is mocked in favor of feasting. It is little wonder, then, that Antony and his officers continually postpone their return to Rome. In a world so conflicted, however, the haven of Egypt is too perfect to last: even as the play opens, the dogs of war are already baying at the gates.

Shakespeare wrote Antony and Cleopatra with a specific venue in mind. Unfortunately, that venue was 4,800 miles from here and it burned to the ground 398 years ago, so we judiciously decided to perform the play in the park instead. The spotlights and dimmers of a modern theatre are replaced by universal sunshine. The audience can see the actors, the actors can see the audience, and the direct communication between characters and audience members is easy and natural, just as the Bard intended.

In Antony and Cleopatra, Shakespeare constructs a world where war is ubiquitous and unending, and where love is rare. For the titular lovers, the sound of boots and battle drums incessantly threatens to drown out their whispered oaths of devotion. The play is, therefore, a masterful metaphor for every couple's everyday life. On behalf of the entire ensemble, thank you for exploring this world with us today. Enjoy!

H DIRECTORS' NOTES THE **TEMPEST**

The Tempest is the last full play that William Shakespeare wrote, and it has always seemed to me that he decided to throw in a little bit of everything he had succeeded at in his previous works; there are fairies and magic, there is some political machination, there's a revenge drama, there are lovers, exotic settings - in short, just about everything but the proverbial kitchen sink. I have also always felt that Will was writing this one for the bleachers - the



workaday folks who needed some pure entertainment, a respite from their day-to-day difficulties. Thus, when I heard that Green-Stage wanted this play in their 2011 season, I jumped at the chance, and was subsequently delighted to hear that they would give me that chance. Not only the chance to direct, but to give this lovely script the comedic turn I have always felt it deserved.

This, of course, lends itself even more to an outdoor setting. Doing a Shakespearean comedy (and yes, I am treating this as a comedy) outside makes everything clearer - louder, for one, more sharp for another, fast-paced and furious in places, and above all BIGGER, for if we don't have the size to fill a park, you kind folks just won't hear us. So... I promise you bigger revenges, louder love, and enormous clowning for this production. GreenStage, the cast and crew and of course myself all hope you enjoy the show.

SIMPLE SUMMARIES OF THE SUMMER SHOWSANTONY AND CLEOPATRATHE TEMPEST



Antony is caught between two worlds; the realm of world domination and that of lustful desire. Beguiled by Cleopatra, Queen of Egypt, he has neglected his duties as one of the Roman triumvirate (Octavius Caesar, Lepidus, and himself) far too long and is called back to Rome to help wage war against the upstart pirate Pompey. Finding himself in a somewhat sticky situation, he must tear himself away from Cleopatra to return to Rome. Back home, away from the temptations of Cleopatra, he solidifies his bond to Rome by marrying Caesar's sister Octavia, knowing full well that his affections still lie with his Egyptian queen. In Alexandria, Cleopatra learns of her lover's marriage in Rome and flies into a jealous rage.

The three Roman rulers arrange a truce with Pompey and indulge in a drunken celebration aboard Pompey's ship. When everyone is completely incapacitated by wine the pirate Menas suggests that Pompey take advantage of the situation and kill the triumvirate and take Rome all for himself. Out of honor, Pompey refuses. Which is too bad since soon enough Caesar and Lepidus break their truce with Pompey and take his lands – all this without bothering to tell Antony. In retaliation, a furious Antony returns to Alexandria, and declares himself and Cleopatra the rulers of Egypt and the eastern third of the Roman Empire. War is now imminent between the Antony and Caesar.

What is to become of Antony and Cleopatra? Will they win their fight against the powers of Rome? Will Antony be ruled by his heart or his head? Just sit back and let us show you how this tale unfolds..."



Meet Prospero – the former Duke of Milan - and his now teenage daughter Miranda. They live on an isolated island populated with spirits, magic and a monster. Twelve years earlier Prospero's bad brother Antonio got greedy for the dukedom, and plotted with the King of Naples to run Prospero and his baby daughter out of town on a raft. Luckily that raft came ashore on the magical island. During their time there, Prospero perfected his magic, and used it to enslave the local fairy Ariel and the creature Caliban.

But now things are taking a turn... A ship has come near the shore, and lo and behold, all of Prospero's enemies are on board. With Ariel's help, Prospero conjures up a magical tempest and wrecks the ship, separating the passengers to various parts of the island – magically unscathed. The King of Naples and his son, Ferdinand, being separated, they each believe the other to be dead.

Now the plots thicken: Young Miranda meets up with Young Ferdinand and their eyes fill with stars; Antonio and the King's brother Sebastian plot to kill the King; and two drunkards from the shipwreck meet up with Caliban, who convinces them to help him murder Prospero.

Will Antonio and Sebastian's conspiracy succeed? Will Caliban's murderous plot against Prospero come to fruition? Will Ferdinand and Miranda go steady? Relax, take a deep breath and let the magic begin...

Jon-Erik Hegstad (Sebastian/Spirit)



Gianni Truzzi (Antonio)


